## Principal's Message

Attendance is vital to improve student achievement. First semester data has indicated that several students do not take their attendance in class very seriously. Our unexcused absences have resulted in many court petitions for truancy. To clarify the importance of attendance the staff of WHS has determined that the focus of next semester will be to closely monitor student attendance.

### **WHS Interventions for Unexcused Absences**

This intervention system is an attempt to improve your student's attendance at Wenatchee High School. The chart explains interventions WHS will take in the event your student receives unexcused absences. **We appreciate and prefer notification the day of your student's absence.** Please keep in mind that you must excuse your student for being absent no later than 48 hours from the day of the absence or it will be unexcused. The purpose of these timely interventions is to improve student attendance and promote academic achievement.

Note:

1. Four tardies = One unexcused absence.
2. If a student receives 6 unexcused absences in any particular class they will receive a shortened schedule.
3. Any student with 3 or more full day unexcused absences will be referred to the District Truancy Officer.

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## Parent Link (Automated Phone calling System)

Our automated phone calling system has been up and running since last year. We use this system to inform you of your child's unverified absences and to keep you informed regarding school matters. If you would like to check the system to see if it has called you within the past seven days, simply dial 663-2246, press "1" to "listen to messages, then enter your phone number when prompted. The system will play any messages sent to you within the past 7 days. If you have any questions about our Parent Link system, please call Kim Fiones, Office Manager, at 663-8117.

### Student Appointments/ Check-Out Procedure

We encourage appointments to be made outside of school hours whenever possible. However, when that is not possible, we ask that parents and students follow the following procedures:

If the appointment is already scheduled, please **send a note** excusing your child for the appointment with him/her that day. Students should bring the note to the attendance office and get a check out slip **prior** to leaving for the appointment. Students who do not check out through the attendance office will be coded as unexcused.

If you need to schedule an appointment, but do not have a time set before your child leaves for school, please let them know you intend to make an appointment for that day. Tell them to check the reader board at break or lunch to see if their name is on it. Once you have the appointment scheduled, call the school office and the information will be given to your child after they check the reader board. Your call will be transferred to the attendance office so that you may verbally excuse your child for the appointment. The other option would be to have your child call you to get the information.



### Telephone Calls for Students/ Deliveries for Students

In order to limit classroom disruption, please be aware that we do not deliver messages to classrooms. The names of students who receive telephone calls from parents are displayed on an electronic reader board outside the office. (We do not accept messages for students from anyone other than the parent or guardian.) Upon seeing or learning that their name is on the board, students come into the office to pick up their message.

We ask parents to limit messages to those of an urgent or emergency nature only. Please direct messages for students to the main office at 663-8117.

Flower and balloon deliveries are not accepted for students at the school. Most flower shops are aware of our policy but with Valentine's Day coming, we thought it would good to remind you.

Personal items such as lunches, books, backpacks, etc. brought for students during the day by a parent/guardian will be held at the front desk. The student's name will be put on the reader board and the student will be expected to come to the office to pick up the items. Deliveries of personal items will not be made to classrooms.



### Lost and Found

Please have your student check the lost and found if they have lost any clothing. Lost and found is located in the ASB Accounting Office. All lost and found clothing items not claimed by February 28 will be donated to the needy.



## Running Start Information Meeting

**Date:** Tuesday, March 21  
**Time:** 7-8 p.m.  
**Place:** WHS Commons

“Running Start,” a governor’s initiative, was enacted by the Legislature in the spring of 1990. This law allows a junior or senior in high school the opportunity to take courses at community colleges or technical colleges as part of the high school program. Credit received from transfer level 100 and 200 college courses counts towards both high school graduation and community college degree programs.

The “Running Start” program is available for students who will be enrolled at Wenatchee High School during their junior and senior years. Students who qualify may be able to take both high school and college classes concurrently during these years and earn high school/college credits at the same time. Thus, they can graduate from WHS and get a “Running Start” or college credits during the same time period. College courses are free for “Running Start” students.

A special meeting hosted by WHS staff and Wenatchee Valley College counselors will be held the evening of March 21, beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the WHS Commons to provide specific information, guidelines and application forms, and to answer questions for interested persons. Hear explanations of the pros and cons of this program.

It is very important that students and parents attend this meeting. Students need to declare their intent to enter Running Start this spring regardless of which quarter classes will be taken next year.



## First Semester Report Cards

First semester report cards will be mailed to students’ homes the week of February 6th. If you have questions about a particular grade or comment on your student’s report card, please contact the teacher directly at 663-8117.

## ACT, SAT Testing

Juniors planning to apply to a 4 year university during their senior year should be signing up to take a college entrance exam. Many students choose to take both the SAT and the ACT, as they are two different tests and taking both gives students the ability to see which test produces a higher score.

The SAT Reasoning Test includes a new section on Critical Reading and a Writing Test, both of which are mandatory if you are taking the SAT. The ACT has an optional writing test which can be added for an additional cost. Not all colleges require the ACT Writing Test, so check with the schools before you sign up.

**Important Note:** Most juniors take these tests in June to allow themselves the full junior year of education before testing. Students can take these tests on various dates throughout the school year, but most wait until the June testing dates. Because so many test in June, the testing sites quickly fill up. **Register now to ensure a spot on the June testing roster.**



## College Conferences for Juniors

All juniors are invited to attend the College Admissions Conference on the Wenatchee Valley College campus. Many of the 4-year universities and community colleges will have their admission officers there to inform high school students about their colleges and programs available.

Students who have signed parent permission forms will be transported to and from WVC by bus. This is a very important pre-college planning session for all juniors to attend.

Please pick up the College Visitation packet in the Counseling Office. Students who do not return signed permission forms by March 25 will not be permitted to attend this half day admissions conference.



## Federal Dollars for School

Getting your hands on federal dollars to send your senior student on to more training after high school requires that you fill out the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** form.

Federal money is limited and given out on a first come, first served basis beginning **January 1, 2006**, for the 2006-2007 school year.

The FAFSA form may qualify students for six areas of Federal funding:

1. Pell Grants.....(up to \$3,250)
2. SEOG.....(up to \$4,000)  
(Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant)
3. Federal Work Study
4. Perkins Loans..... (up to \$4,000)
5. Stafford Loans.....(up to \$2,625 1st yr.)
6. Federal PLUS Loans..... (amount varies)

It is essential that you send in your application as soon as possible since Federal funds are limited. (Do not be deceived by the June 30 deadline on the FAFSA Form.) WHS considers February 15 as a last resort deadline. **(Copy form before mailing!)**

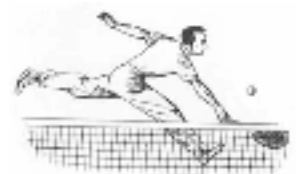

## Culminating Project Lesson - February 14

## Academic Challenge Orientation for Freshmen

Freshmen who have earned a 3.0 GPA or higher during first semester are invited to attend an informational meeting about the Academic Challenge Program. It will be held in the **WHS Commons on Tuesday evening, February 28, at 7:00 p.m.** This is a four year program, and only freshmen may apply.

Academic Challenge is designed for students desiring a rigorous and well-balanced program in the academic disciplines. By fulfilling the requirements of the Academic Challenge program for four years, students are very well prepared for the process of college applications and scholarships. By graduation, students will complete the following minimum requirements:

- 3.0 GPA each semester
- 4 credits in English
- 3 credits in Math through Trigonometry or Precalculus
- 3 credits of Science including Chemistry or Physics
- 3 credits in a Foreign Language
- Business Computer Applications 1
- Participation in at least one sport or club per year
- Completion of 10 hours of community service per year



Students who wish to achieve at a higher level of performance may be recognized at graduation for the Distinguished Scholar Award. In order to achieve the Distinguished Scholar level in the Academic Challenge Program, students must fulfill the following *additional* requirements:

1. At least a 3.5 cumulative GPA at graduation
2. Member of National Honor Society
3. Four years of Math through Precalculus
4. Meet WASL standards in all four areas
5. A total of 15 hours or more of community service per year
6. A total of five credits from the following options:
  - Honors classes
  - AP courses or taking AP exams
  - A fourth year in the same foreign language

Qualifying students and their parents are invited to attend the meeting on February 28th. ## Help for Citing Research Sources

Wenatchee High School students will have many research opportunities and assignments as they progress through their high school career. Since most research builds on the previous work of others, it is important that credit be given to the sources that are used i.e. magazines, newspapers, books, the internet, personal interviews etc. To not cite one's sources is plagiarism. (See WHS Plagiarism Policy under Information on the WHS web page).

In an effort to assist students with accurately documenting their research sources, the WHS Library web page:

(<http://whs.wsd.wednet.edu/Faculty/Library/lib.html>)

provides a link called Research Help. Here, students are provided with several connections to the MLA (Modern Language Association) reference format which is the WHS default research paper and bibliography style. They also have access to Citation Maker. This interactive site, created by Oregon School Library Information System, allows the user to type in the information for the most common types of sources in an easy to use fill-in-the-box format. It then puts the information in the correct bibliographic form. Books on writing research papers and personal reference help from the library staff are always available to students.

## Parent Talk



Finishing strong is a sometimes forgotten concept in the culture of the 21st century. How many of us have undone projects sitting in our garages, yards or family rooms? Is it any different for our kids? Many students have expended enthusiasm, energy, and effort to get off the launching pad in their classes only to crash and burn at the end. Why? They forgot that life (or school) is a marathon, not a sprint. Just as a runner can't slow down or stop in the middle of a race neither can a student "kick back" for a period of time and expect that "all is well."

Remind your son or daughter that it is the small accomplishments each day that eventually lead to success in the end. Of course, if your teen is a senior it is essential to keep up to avoid the panic that too many experience. Take nothing for granted. Be a "hands-on" parent throughout their school years and do a check-up periodically with counselors/teachers. Look for grade reports and know when they come out or check online.

Ultimately, finishing strong is a decision that each person has to make for themselves. However, we should discourage the "just get by" philosophy that permeates many segments of society. Provide examples--both positive and negative--from your own life to show there are real consequences as a result of our choices. Our goal should be for our teens to learn and experience the importance of finishing strong in all that they do.

## Panther Prevention Corner

Often parents will ask me, "How do I know if my child might be using substances?" While there is no one easy answer, the best advice I can give is to pay attention! There are many behaviors, attitudes and appearances that, collectively, can be red flags that may warrant investigation. Below are some of them:

- **Changes at home:** Loss of interest in family activities, disrespect for family rules, secretiveness, withdrawal from responsibilities, anger at or about parents, sudden increase or decrease in appetite, disappearance of valuable items and/or drugs/alcohol from house.
- **Changes at school:** Sudden drop in grades, truancy, loss of interest in learning, unrealistic attempt to excel, defiant of authority, poor attitude towards sports or other extracurricular activities, loss of energy, reduced memory and attention span.
- **Changes in personal appearance:** Physical decline: pale or otherwise changed complexion; bloated appearance; bloodshot eyes; bruises; burn marks on fingers; slurred speech; dark circles around eyes; loss of weight; sloppy dressing.
- **Lifestyle changes:** Wears drug oriented clothing, always keeps jacket on, has unexplained money or constantly needs money, avoids group activities and contact with old friends and adults, makes new friends who use drugs, receives phone calls (often short ones) at odd hours of the night, lies about activities.
- **Personality changes:** Unexplainable mood swings and behavior; negative, argumentative, paranoid; over-reacts to criticism; acts rebellious, destructive, overly tired or hyperactive, unhappy or depressed; anxious, irritable, verbally abusive; cheats, steals; has preoccupation with death and morbid subjects.
- **Use of cover-ups:** Burns incense or sprays air freshener/cologne in room; sprays perfume or cologne excessively on body; uses mouth spray; uses eye wash to cover-up eyes irritated from marijuana.
- **Physical evidence:** Smell of alcohol or marijuana on breath or body; roaches (butts), roach holders, clips, rolling papers, seeds, leaves, small pipes, or other drug paraphernalia; burnt pieces of aluminum foil, empty cold medicine packaging or other OTC (over the counter) medication packaging, empty aerosol cans; plastic bags with material that resembles oregano (marijuana) or white powder (cocaine).

While these signs do not prove that a drug problem exists, they do indicate that warning signs are present. Setting and enforcing limits helps teens to say "No" to risky behaviors. There is no such thing as "responsible use" for teens. Be a good role model, ask questions and keep your eyes open. Addiction is for life! Don't let your teen fall into the substance-using trap.

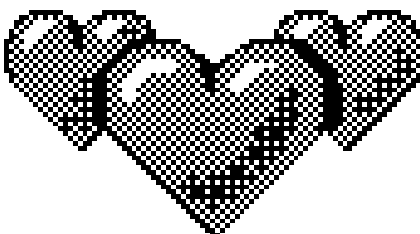

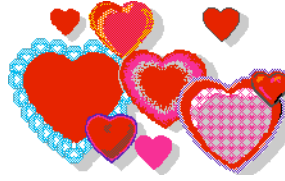
