AP Exams

Students enrolled in an Advanced Placement class are strongly encouraged to take AP exams in early May. **In order to register, students must pay for their AP exams in the ASB office by March 29.** "This is the only way I will know which exams to order," according to AP Coordinator, Terri Bawden, "so it is imperative to meet this deadline."

The cost of each exam is \$82. Students who qualify for free or reduced lunch will automatically receive a fee reduction. Their cost is \$5 per exam. Students who are not in the Free and Reduced Lunch Program may still qualify for a fee reduction, but they must fill out a Declaration of Income Form available from their AP teacher. These must be returned to their AP teacher by March 21.

The AP exams will occur during the first two weeks of May. Please refer to the *Bulletin for AP Students and Parents* for information about the exams and schedules. Copies of this publication are available from AP teachers. If you have additional questions, please call Mrs. Bawden at 662-9047.

College Conferences for Juniors

All juniors are invited to attend the College Admissions Conference on the Wenatchee Valley College campus. Many of the 4-year universities and community colleges will have their admission officers there to inform high school students about their colleges and programs available.

Students who have signed parent permission forms will be transported to and from WVC by bus. This is a very important pre-college planning session for all juniors to attend.

Please pick up the College Visitation packet in the Counseling Office. Students who do not return signed permission forms by March 25 will not be permitted to attend this half day admissions conference.

Advanced Placement Program

What is the Advanced Placement Program?

The Advanced Placement Program is an opportunity for students to take college level classes while still in high school without leaving campus. By taking a national exam, you may earn credit or advanced placement from thousands of colleges and universities that participate in the Advanced Placement Program worldwide. All colleges and universities in Washington state accept AP (Advanced Placement) credit.

What are the benefits?

The work you do in an AP course will help you develop skills and study habits that will be vital in college. For example, you will learn how to analyze problems effectively, improve your writing skills, and prepare for exams. These are tools that will serve you well throughout your college career and beyond.

Once you are used to being challenged you are more likely to continue with advanced studies. Recent research (Adelman, 1999) found that high school seniors who took only one AP class nearly doubled the likelihood of graduation from college (59% compared to 33% of those who did not take an AP class). Students who took two or more AP Courses raised the likelihood to 76%. This study also found that the academic intensity of course work taken in high school is the best predictor of student success in college, regardless of socioeconomic status or ethnicity.

How do I get involved in the AP Program?

Work with your counselor in middle school, 9th and 10th grades to help plan your courses and decide which AP classes to take.

- AP Physics
- AP Calculus
- AP U. S. History
- AP Art Studio (Directed Study)
- (4th year Foreign Language Students often take the AP exam)

AVID Program

Orchard Middle School and Wenatchee High School are offering an AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) elective to students this year, in the hopes of leveling the field for students who come from non-college backgrounds.

AVID is a national college-prep program that began in San Diego, Calif., 25 years ago for capable students who come from families with little or no formal education. They often score well on achievement tests, particularly in Math (an indicator of college ability), but aren't doing as well in classes as their tests indicate they could perform because of poor study habits and/or organization, limited parent awareness, low expectations, lack of confidence and/or motivation.

OMS has 41 students in its two pilot AVID classes. WHS has one AVID class that was originally open only to freshmen who came from Orchard, because the GEAR UP grant is tied to OMS, and can only be used to benefit OMS students. The high school class is taught by Carrolyn Halvorson.

This daily elective class offers:

- Class tutorials twice a week, where students work in small groups (with tutors from Wenatchee Valley College) to help each other work out academic problems
- Weekly binder checks to encourage organization
- Instruction in keeping Cornell notes or Learning Logs to further cement what students are learning in class
- Instruction in goal-setting, test-taking skills and college awareness
- Information about financial aid
- Field trips to colleges
- Speakers who discuss their jobs and the education they needed to achieve their career goals.

Parent Talk



Expectations are what motivates many of us and the same can be said of our teens. For instance, if it is important to you that your son/daughter is a leader, communicate it to them. Then, over time being a leader may become important to them. On the other hand, if you expect your teen to follow the crowd then most likely he/she will. After all, it is far easier to float downstream with the majority than fight their way upstream against the cultural current. As they begin their journey by trying to do the right thing in various situations they can count on criticism coming their way. Leaders who try to stand tall always make the easiest targets. Since discouragement is usually inevitable at some point, some parental encouragement is in order. First, give some focused attention and allow your teen to talk about the difficulties they have experienced with peers and others. This lets them know that they are supported because you took the time to listen. Secondly, when you hear of your teen standing up against peer pressure or doing the right thing in some circumstance reward them with words of acknowledgment and praise. In fact, "overpay" them with words to counteract the negative comments they may be receiving from others. Although there are no guarantees that high expectations will work for every teen, the odds are in your favor. If we pursue this approach, we as parents will be supplying society with some desperately needed leaders who will not seek popularity above doing what is right. Thanks to Steve Farrar in his book, "Standing Tall" for some of these insights.

Students Can Earn College Credits While Attending WHS

Did you know that students can earn college credits without leaving the WHS campus? Students who successfully complete the requirements can earn the credits while taking one or more of the WHS Tech Prep articulated courses listed below. They can begin earning these college credits during your Freshman year and students only pay a one-time \$15 fee for all the credits you accumulate. 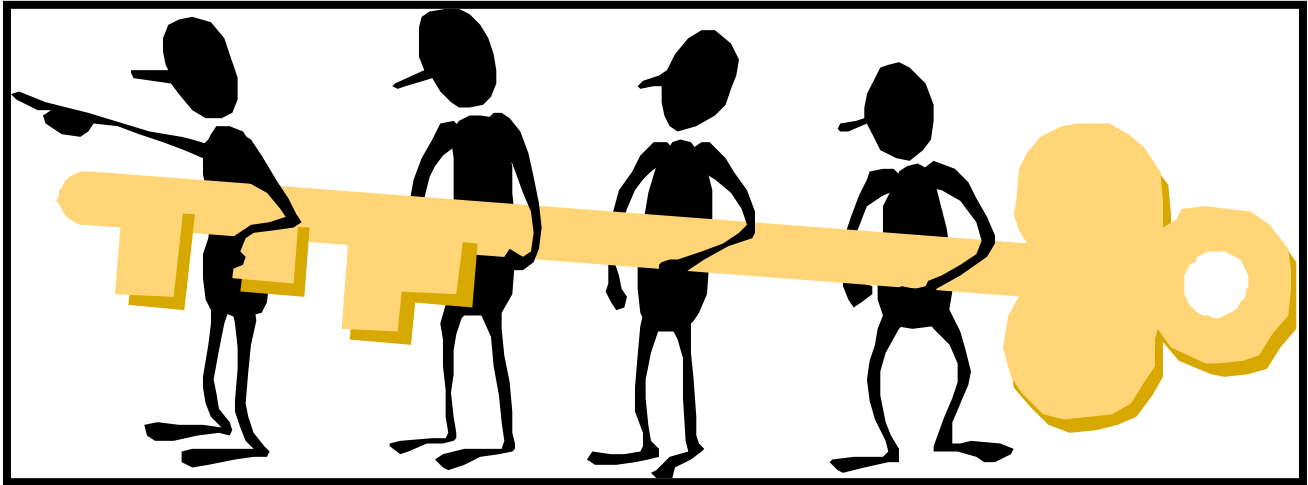
